Sarah's Story:

Sarah has made such good friends through the Superstars Special Needs Cheer Program. I wish I could tell you that Sarah has tons of friends and her average day is full of rainbows and butterflies, but that is not true. Most of Sarah's days are gray and gloomy.

Kids make fun of her, what she wears, how she talks, and her

thought process. I make a point to ask Sarah how was your day today. Sometimes she tells me of a friend at school that liked her shirt or shoes. (Sarah loves shoes.) But most of the time she asks if she could go to another school – one where there are nicer people. The sad thing is I don't know if there is one. But through it all I remind Sarah how amazing she is God made you just as you are supposed to be.

Walk with your head high Sarah because you are so smart, so beautiful, and so amazing. Just ask Sarah, she will tell you Mondays are the best because she gets to go to CHEER at the Y!! She loves this program so very much!! She is just one of the girls here. She makes best friends here. Here she is a darn good cheerleader!! So I want to say thank you. STORIES OF IMPACT: Ways the Y IS MAKING A DIFFERENCE IN OUR COMMUNITY



Grace's Story:

Grace has hated water since infancy, due to a sensory processing disorder. Her occupational therapist suggested that Grace get involved in more physical activities as they help to regulate the sensory systems. Swim has been particularly challenging because it uses so many of the sensory systems at once. So a consistent, 1-on-1 teacher in a quieter pool has been a game changer for Grace. She doesn't have to battle through processing a lot of "extra" stuff and can focus on the lesson. Grace can now do a 30 minute lesson independently in the pool swimming both in the shallow and deep end.

Grace has built trust with her swim instructor and her parents have seen tremendous growth in her confidence and ability to handle situations both in and out of the pool

since their family joined the Y. Sometimes swim lessons are about learning lots more than just how to swim well!

Grace's parents regret not joining the Y sooner. They realize it has actually given them a place to bring Grace (and their other three kids) that is familiar and routine (eliminating some of that sensory background noise) but also offers diverse enough

programs that can continue to help her grow and manage her sensory issues constructively. She's always happy to come to the Y and seems to feel a sense of community here. They frequently utilize the youth center for her proprioceptive needs (muscles and joints) and she's a gymnastics student, too. Grace's parents have been amazed at how invested the Y staff have been helping Grace (and their other kids) succeed.

accident. Though this
continues to be an
incredibly difficult time in
the lives of these

children, our Y has been able to play a small part in bringing them some joy and relief. Initially, this support came through being a part of the Y Child Development Center family. Though Chloe and Carson had previously only attended every other week, we were able to secure spots during the additional weeks for them as well. Having a safe place for the children to go and fun activities and friends to help keep their minds occupied are a daily blessing. One beautiful picture was the first day Chloe was back and another child sat with her and they talked through what Chloe was feeling as they played. Carson has struggled with some loud and negative behaviors since this event in his life. Through it all, we have maintained good communication with Mom and continue to help him walk through these responses.

Practically, the Y was able to offer the family some toys at Christmastime. We were also able to offer a scholarship to help offset costs of additional attendance and changing incomes. In seeking another way to support the family, Mom let us know that she felt a birthday party for the Chloe and Carson at the facility would give them a chance to enjoy something fun as a family. The Y was blessed to be able to provide the family with use of the facility to celebrate life together.
